ORDER

SUB: IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE JUDGEMENT DATED 20.08.2026 IN WA 3347 OF 2025 – M/S. COSMOPOLITAN TECHNOLOGY OF MARITIME.

1. Cosmopolitan Technology of Maritime (CTM) (MTI No. 402008) located at Sengadu Post, Ulundai Village, Sriperumbadur Taluk, Sriperumbadur, Kancheepuram, Tamil Nadu-602002 is Directorate General of Maritime Administration (hereinafter referred as DGMA) approved Maritime Training Institute (hereinafter referred as 'MTI') for conducting the DGMA approved Maritime Courses. The CTM is run by Cosmopolitan Educational and Social Development Trust, represented by its Director Dr. N. Vijayakumar.
2. Whereas, the MTI was originally approved under Approval No. TR/A/76/2018 dated 14.12.2018 for conducting, inter alia, the Training for General Purpose Rating (GP Rating) Course with an approved intake of 40 candidates in 9 batches per annum, i.e. 360 candidates per annum, as recorded in the judgment dated 20.08.2026 of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025.
3. Whereas, the Directorate, upon review of the regulatory position and deficiencies concerning the MTI, issued an order dated 28.08.2024 revising the approved intake for the GP Rating Course from 40 candidates in 9 batches per annum to 40 candidates in 2 batches per annum, i.e. 80 candidates per annum, with effect from 01.01.2025; and whereas the said regulatory history has been noticed by the Hon'ble Madras High Court in its judgment dated 20.08.2026.
4. Whereas, accordingly, for the January 2025 GP Rating batch, the sanctioned intake applicable to the MTI was 80 candidates; and whereas the MTI admitted an additional 80 candidates over and above the sanctioned intake.
5. Whereas, the MTI, vide undertaking dated 19.03.2025, stated that all deficiencies had been complied with and whereas MMD, Chennai conducted a verification inspection on 21.03.2025 and found that 09 out of the 10 deficiencies remained unresolved, and further noted that the MTI was conducting the GP Rating Course batch with a strength of 160

candidates and the CCMC course batch with 3 candidates, in violation of the DGS Speaking Order dated 28.08.2024.

6. Whereas, in pursuance of the judgment dated 10.06.2025 in W.A. Nos. 1211 and 1212 of 2025, the compliance verification inspection was conducted on 02.07.2025, the Directorate issued an order dated 07.07.2025 revising the approved intake for the GP Rating Course to 40 candidates in 6 batches per annum, i.e. 240 candidates per annum, with immediate effect, which revised approval, as recorded by the Hon'ble High Court, operated prospectively.
7. Whereas, the said order dated 07.07.2025 directed the MTI to accommodate the excess candidates admitted under the previously unauthorised batches by re-registering them and permitting them to undergo training afresh in the newly approved batches, with the fees already collected to be set off against such re-admission; and further directed that no further fees or charges shall be demanded from or paid by such candidates, that any amount collected in excess of the prescribed fee shall be refunded within 10 days of the issuance of that Order, and that, in the alternative, the MTI shall initiate appropriate action to refund the fees collected from candidates admitted beyond the previously approved intake.
8. Whereas, the issue arising from the admission of the additional 80 candidates in the January 2025 GP Rating batch came to be considered in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025 before the Hon'ble High Court of Madras; and whereas, by interim order dated 11.12.2025, the Hon'ble Court, taking note of the additional 80 candidates admitted over the approved intake of 80, permitted all 160 students of the January 2025 batch to appear for the examination scheduled on 19.12.2025, subject to the condition that the results of the additional candidates would remain withheld pending the final outcome of the writ appeal.
9. Whereas, the said 80 additionally admitted candidates accordingly appeared for the examination held on 19.12.2025 along with the other candidates of the January 2025 batch, and their results remained withheld in terms of the interim order dated 11.12.2025 by the Hon'ble Court in W.A 3347 of 2025.
10. Whereas, the Hon'ble High Court of Madras, after considering the facts and circumstances of the case, delivered its judgment dated 20.08.2026 in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025, reserved on 22.07.2026, wherein, while condemning the admission of 80 students by the MTI beyond the permitted intake capacity, the Court recorded that:

“ Court is deeply conscious of the fact that no admission can be permitted beyond the sanctioned intake capacity and the institution cannot be allowed to admit students in blatant violation of the permitted threshold and subsequently, take shelter under the guise of equity or sympathy by putting the future of the students in the forefront. If at all anyone is to be blamed for this situation, it is solely the appellant, which consciously and deliberately went ahead and

admitted students beyond the permitted intake which has been deprecated by this Court as well as the Hon'ble Supreme Court".

11. Whereas, the Hon'ble Court, balancing the equities and having regard to the career prospects of the students who had already appeared in the examination, directed publication of the results of the said 80 additional students and further directed that an independent evaluation be conducted thereafter to ensure that they possess the requisite practical knowledge and have completed the necessary training, and, upon such satisfaction, permitted them to receive the course completion certificates, subject to their being successful in the examination.

12. Whereas, the operative directions contained in paragraph 21 of the judgment dated 20.08.2026 of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025 are reproduced below:

"21. The fact remains that these eighty students have already appeared for the examinations held in December 2025 pursuant to the interim orders passed by this Court and are awaiting their results. Though we strongly deprecate the conduct of the appellant/institution in admitting these 80 students beyond the permitted intake capacity, considering the peculiar facts and circumstances of the present case, where the appellant had originally permitted intake of 360 students for the GP Rating Course, which stood reduced to 80 students in the January 2025 batch, however, got restored to 240 students in the June 2025 batch, we are inclined to pass the following order to balance the equity and protect the career prospects of the students who have already appeared for the examinations:

- i. Accordingly, the impugned order passed by the Writ Court is set aside. The respondents are directed to publish the results of the 80 additional students who were admitted to the GP Rating Course in the January 2025 batch, who have appeared for the examination held on 19.12.2025.*
- ii. The respondents shall conduct an independent evaluation for these 80 additionally admitted students to ensure that they have acquired the requisite practical knowledge and completed the necessary training and on such satisfaction, these 80 students shall be permitted to receive their course completion certificates, if they are successful in the results that are yet to be published.*
- iii. It is made clear that since the appellant has confined this appeal solely to the GP Rating Course, we have not adjudicated upon any other aspects of the matter.*
- iv. The appellant shall bear the expenses incurred by the respondents in conducting evaluation as directed in clause (ii) above."*

13. Whereas, in order to give effect to the aforesaid judicial directions, the matter was considered by the Directorate, including in the deliberations of the 82nd STCW

Compliance Board Meeting; and whereas, upon such consideration and the modalities proposed by the Principal Officer, MMD, Chennai, a six-member Independent Evaluation Committee has been constituted to undertake the independent evaluation of the eligible candidates, in accordance with the directions of the Hon'ble High Court.

14. Whereas, pursuant to the judgment dated 20.08.2026, the withheld results of the said 80 additionally admitted candidates are required to be published in the first instance; and whereas such publication is required to be understood as a necessary step in the judicially mandated process and not, by itself, as a final determination of eligibility for issuance of the Course Completion Certificate.
15. Whereas, the BEST Exit examination result publication shall therefore carry the following caveat: "This result is provisional and does not, by itself, constitute final determination of eligibility for the course completion certificate. Candidates who pass the BEST Exit examination are subject to independent verification as directed by the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A. No.3347 of 2025 dated 20.08.2026, and the certificate shall be issued only upon successful completion of such verification."
16. Whereas, the independent evaluation is required to be independent in substance and procedure and confined to candidates who have successfully cleared the examination held on 19.12.2025 (BEST Exit examination), passing of which shall not, by itself, confer entitlement to the Course Completion Certificate; and whereas, having regard to the nature and object of the judicial direction, it has been decided that the evaluation of such eligible candidates shall be conducted by way of oral and practical assessment, the detailed modalities of which, including its venue, date and procedural safeguards, are set out in the operative directions below.
17. Whereas, the Independent Evaluation Committee shall vet, scrutinize and independently verify the performance and competence of the eligible candidates so as to satisfy itself that they have acquired the requisite practical knowledge and completed the necessary training, in terms of the directions of the Hon'ble High Court, and shall submit its assessment/report accordingly.
18. Whereas, the 80 additional candidates were admitted beyond the sanctioned intake capacity of the MTI and is claimed to have undergone the course and examination process in the circumstances arising in the present matter; and whereas, in the interest of the affected candidates and to ensure that they are not subjected to further financial prejudice on account of such excess admission, the Directorate considers it necessary, as a consequential regulatory measure, to direct the MTI to refund the applicable fees and charges to any such candidate who is unsuccessful either in the BEST Exit examination or in the independent evaluation directed under this Order, in accordance with the final outcome of the respective process and the conditions stipulated herein.

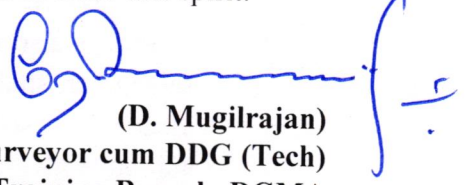
NOW, THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers vested in the Directorate General of Maritime Administration and in compliance with the judgment dated 20.08.2026 of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025, the following directions are hereby issued for strict compliance:

- A. The results of the 80 additionally admitted candidates who appeared for the examination held on 19.12.2025 is published as enclosure in **Annexure -I** dated 19.12.2025 and subject to the caveat as stated in the Para 14. The result is accompanied by the caveat that such publication shall not, by itself, constitute final determination of eligibility for issuance of the Course Completion Certificate.
- B. Only those candidates among the aforesaid 80 candidates who have successfully cleared the examination held on 19.12.2025/BEST Exit examination, as reflected in the official result, shall be eligible for the independent evaluation.
- C. The six-member Independent Evaluation Committee constituted for the purpose shall conduct the independent evaluation. MMD, Chennai Surveyor(s), as nominated by PO, MMD, Chennai, shall remain present as observers throughout the evaluation process and shall oversee the proper conduct of the proceedings, including adherence to the approved modalities and procedures, attendance, documentation and maintenance of records. The surveyors shall not form part of the Independent Evaluation Committee or participate in the substantive assessment, evaluation or scoring of candidates.
- D. The independent evaluation shall be conducted by way of oral and practical assessment, having regard to the nature and object of the judicial direction, namely, to ascertain whether each eligible candidate has acquired the requisite practical knowledge and completed the necessary practical training. The modality for the independent evaluation is detailed in **Annexure-II of this Order.**]
- E. The evaluation shall be conducted in accordance with uniform modalities and criteria communicated to the examiners before commencement. A separate assessment sheet/record shall be maintained for each candidate, identifying the candidate and recording attendance, assessment undertaken, relevant observations and the outcome. The assessment record shall be authenticated by the concerned examiners and preserved as part of the official record.
- F. MMD, Chennai shall conduct a briefing meeting with the examiners on 15.09.2026, being the day preceding the scheduled evaluation, for briefing on the approved modalities, procedures, documentation and preservation of the independence and integrity of the evaluation.

- G. The independent evaluation shall be conducted from 0800 Hrs onwards on 16.09.2026 at AMET University, 135, East Coast Road, Kanathur - 603 112, Tamil Nadu, subject to any written modification issued by the Directorate/MMD, Chennai for administrative reasons.
- H. The MTI shall immediately ensure that all the eligible candidates are apprised regarding the date, venue, reporting time, identity requirements, schedule and other necessary instructions. The MTI shall maintain documentary proof of such communication and submit confirmation thereof.
- I. Every eligible candidate as referred in Para A above, shall be subject to independent verification and report in person at the venue as mentioned under Para 24. Attendance shall be recorded and linked to the candidate's assessment sheet. A candidate who fails to appear on the scheduled time and date fixed of such evaluation; shall be treated as "failed" in the independent evaluation.
- J. The MTI shall within three working days of this order make available to MMD, Chennai all relevant training records, attendance records, practical-training records, course-related documents and other records as may be required for verification of completion of necessary training. The MTI shall ensure that such records are complete, authentic and capable of being correlated with the individual candidate.
- K. The MTI may nominate two representatives on their behalf, including but not limited to providing logistical and administrative assistance at the time of the independent evaluation. The MTI or their representatives shall not interfere with, influence, communicate improperly with, or otherwise attempt to compromise the independent assessment of any candidate. Any such attempt shall be viewed seriously and may invite appropriate regulatory action in accordance with the procedures established under law.
- L. The assessment sheets/results shall, as far as practicable, shall be verified and handed over by the evaluation committee to MMD, Chennai on the same day at the conclusion of the evaluation. MMD, Chennai shall consolidate the assessment report and forward the complete record to the Directorate General of Maritime Administration for further necessary action.
- M. The assessment/report of the Independent Evaluation Committee shall form part of the record for final determination regarding the eligibility of the candidate by the Directorate. Accordingly, the MTI is hereby directed to act in strict compliance with the final directions communicated by the Directorate, that will be issued subsequent to completion of the evaluation processes.

- N. No Course Completion Certificate shall be issued merely on the basis of publication of the result or passing of the examination held on 19.12.2025/BEST Exit examination. The MTI shall issue the Course Completion Certificate only to candidates, who have successfully cleared the first-level examination, and have successfully satisfied the Independent Evaluation Committee in the independent evaluation, and are thereafter included in the final outcome communicated/approved by the Directorate.
- O. Nothing contained in this Order shall be construed as retrospective approval, ratification or regularisation of the admission of candidates beyond the sanctioned intake applicable to the January 2025 batch. The present process is confined to implementation of the specific directions issued by the Hon'ble High Court in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025.
- P. All expenses incurred in connection with the independent evaluation, including applicable honorarium to Committee members as per applicable norms and other legitimate expenses directly connected with the evaluation, shall be borne entirely by the MTI. The MTI shall not recover any such evaluation expense from the candidates.
- Q. The MTI shall refund the applicable fees/charges collected from each candidate who is finally declared unsuccessful in the present process, including tuition fee, hostel fee, wherever applicable, and other course-related fees/charges, to the extent and in the manner determined by the Directorate.
- R. Here it is also clarified that a candidate, whose evaluation is carried out by virtue of this Order, shall be treated as unsuccessful; if the said candidate has not successfully clear the first-level examination or, having cleared the first-level examination, is subsequently declared unsuccessful in the independent evaluation.
- S. The refund shall be effected by the MTI after issuance of the final candidate-wise results by the Directorate and shall be completed within 07 (seven) working days from the date of issue of such final results.
- T. Within the same period of 07 (seven) working days, the MTI shall submit to the Directorate General of Maritime Administration, through MMD, Chennai, documentary proof of refund to each unsuccessful candidate (i.e. who is found as unsuccessful, either in the BEST Exit examination or subsequent to the independent evaluation directed under this Order), together with a candidate-wise statement containing, at a minimum, name of candidate, candidate/roll number, tuition fee collected, hostel fee collected wherever applicable, other course-related fees/charges collected wherever applicable, total amount refunded, date of refund, mode of payment and transaction/reference number and such other proof, as applicable.

- U. The MTI shall maintain complete and auditable records of all refunds and produce the same whenever called for. Failure to effect refund within the stipulated period, failure to furnish proof, furnishing incomplete or unverifiable particulars, or recovery of evaluation expenses from candidates shall constitute non-compliance with this Order and shall invite appropriate regulatory action, without prejudice to any other action permissible under applicable law, rules, regulations, orders or approvals.
- V. This Order is confined to implementation of the judgment dated 20.08.2026 in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025 in respect of the 80 additionally admitted candidates of the January 2025 GP Rating batch. Nothing herein shall prejudice, restrict or otherwise affect the regulatory powers of the Directorate General of Maritime Administration/MMD, Chennai in respect of the MTI or any other matter under the applicable statutory and regulatory framework.
- W. The MTI shall take immediate action to comply with every direction contained herein and shall ensure that all eligible candidates are duly informed and that all arrangements necessary for the independent evaluation are completed in coordination with MMD, Chennai.
- X. This Speaking Order is issued in absolute compliance with the directions in the judgment dated 20.08.2026, rendered by the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025, and in pursuance of the deliberations of the 82nd STCW Compliance Board Meeting. The directions herein shall be complied with in letter and spirit.

ANNEXURE II

STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE

Independent Evaluation of the Additionally Admitted Candidates of the January 2025 GP
Rating Batch

Cosmopolitan Technology of Maritime, Sriperumbudur (MTI No. 402008)

Issued in pursuance of the judgment dated 20.08.2026 of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.A.
No. 3347 of 2025 and the Speaking Order of the Directorate General of Maritime Administration to
which this procedure is annexed

Part A. General

Purpose

1. This procedure lays down the manner in which the Independent Evaluation Committee constituted under the Speaking Order (the Order) shall assess whether each eligible candidate has acquired the requisite practical knowledge and has completed the necessary training for the General Purpose Rating course, in terms of direction (ii) of paragraph 21 of the judgment dated 20.08.2026. The evaluation is a verification of competence and completion of training. It is not a fresh examination in substitution of the exit examination already held on 19.12.2025, and it is not a review of that examination.

Basis and standard

2. The procedure is adapted from the Guidelines for the All India Exit Examination issued by the Board of Examinations for Seafarers Trust (BES), namely WI 6, GSK Practical and Orals (Rev 06) and WI 7, MEK Practical and Orals (Rev 07), both dated 01.01.2024. The tasks, subject areas, marking structure and pass norm applied under this procedure are those ordinarily applied to a GP Rating candidate at the exit examination. The standard is neither relaxed nor enhanced on account of the circumstances in which the candidates were admitted.
3. Where this procedure is silent, the BES guidelines referred to in paragraph 2 apply. Where there is any inconsistency, the Order and this procedure prevail. Any question of interpretation arising on the day of evaluation is decided by the MMD Chennai and recorded in the Committee Report (Form IE 6).

Scope

4. This procedure applies only to those candidates named in Annexure I to the Order who have passed the BES exit examination held on 19.12.2025, referred to in this procedure as eligible candidates. It does not apply to any other candidate, batch or institute. Nothing in this procedure regularises, ratifies or approves the admission of any candidate beyond the sanctioned intake of the institute.

Definitions

5. In this procedure, unless the context requires otherwise, the following expressions have the meanings assigned to them below.

Expression	Meaning
Order	The Speaking Order of the Directorate General of Maritime Administration (DGMA) to which this procedure is annexed as Annexure II.
Committee	The six member Independent Evaluation Committee constituted under the Order.
Chairperson	The member of the Committee designated as Chairperson by DGMA or by the Principal Officer, MMD Chennai.
GSK Panel	The three members of the Committee assigned to assess General Ship Knowledge (deck) practical, oral and journal.
MEK Panel	The three members of the Committee assigned to assess Marine Engineering Knowledge practical, oral and journal.
Observer	A Surveyor of MMD Chennai nominated by the Principal Officer, MMD Chennai under the Order.
MTI	Cosmopolitan Technology of Maritime, Sriperumbudur (MTI No. 402008), run by Cosmopolitan Educational and Social Development Trust.
Venue	AMET University, 135 East Coast Road, Kanathur 603 112, Tamil Nadu, or such other place as may be notified in writing under the Order.
Eligible candidate	A candidate named in Annexure I to the Order who has passed the BES exit examination held on 19.12.2025.
Record Book	The Pre Sea Training Practical Record Book and Journal (GSK part and MEK part) maintained by the candidate during the course and endorsed by the MTI.
Assessment Sheet	The candidate wise assessment record in Form IE 3.

Part B. Committee and Participants

Composition

- The Committee consists of six members. Three members with a nautical background form the GSK Panel and three members with a marine engineering background form the MEK Panel.

Independence of members

- Before commencement, each member signs a Declaration of Independence in Form IE 1 confirming that he or she has no present or past association with the MTI, its trust, management or staff, has no relationship with any eligible candidate, has no financial or other interest in the outcome, and has not been approached by any person in connection with the evaluation. A member who is unable to sign the declaration, or who becomes aware of a conflict at any stage, informs the Chairperson at once and withdraws. The Principal Officer, MMD Chennai substitutes the member in writing.
- Honorarium and expenses of members are settled directly through MTI in pursuance of the order of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras dated 20.08.2026 in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025, reserved on 22.07.2026. No member accepts any payment, gift, hospitality or favour of any kind from the MTI, the Venue institution, any candidate or any person connected with them.

Observers

9. The Observers (MMD Surveyors) verify identity and attendance, confirm that video recording is operational, oversee adherence to this procedure, custody of records and documentation, and record any irregularity in Part D of the Committee Report. The Observers do not assess, question or score any candidate and do not sit with a Panel during assessment. An Observer may require the Chairperson to pause proceedings where an irregularity is noticed; the pause and the reason are recorded.

MTI representatives

10. The MTI may nominate up to two representatives, whose names are furnished to MMD Chennai in advance, for logistical and administrative assistance only. The representatives remain outside the assessment areas while assessment is in progress, do not communicate with any candidate after registration, and do not approach any member of the Committee on the substance of the evaluation. No instructor or other staff of the MTI other than the two nominated representatives is present at the Venue. Any breach is recorded and reported under the Order.

Venue institution

11. The Venue institution provides the deck training area, workshop, equipment and materials listed in Form IE 5, functioning video recording of all assessment areas, first aid arrangements, drinking water and a waiting area for candidates. Its staff assist only in making equipment available and safe. They do not guide, prompt or assist any candidate and do not intervene in the conduct of any task.

Part C. Preparation

Briefing of the Committee

12. MMD Chennai conducts a briefing of all members and Observers on 15.09.2026, the day preceding the evaluation. The briefing covers this procedure, the roles of members and Observers, the day plan, the allocation of tasks and stations within each Panel, the forms to be used, the handling of the Record Books, the treatment of absent and marginal candidates, and the preservation of independence and confidentiality. Declarations in Form IE 1 are signed at the briefing. Where practicable, the Committee inspects the Venue on the same day.

Records to be furnished by the MTI

13. In terms of the Order, the MTI furnishes to MMD Chennai, within three working days of the Order, the attendance records, practical training records, course records and the Record Book of every eligible candidate, arranged candidate wise and capable of being correlated to the candidate by name and candidate code. The Record Books are delivered under a covering list and are held by MMD Chennai until handed to the Panels on the day of evaluation.
14. Where the Record Book of a candidate has not been furnished or is incomplete, the Panel records that fact on the Assessment Sheet, awards marks for the journal

component on such evidence as is available, and flags the candidate in the Committee Report. The candidate is nonetheless assessed in full on the practical and oral components. The Directorate takes a view on the missing record at the stage of final determination.

Documents to be held by the Committee on the day

15. The observers ensures that the following are available at the Venue before registration opens: the list of eligible candidates in Annexure I to the Order; the attendance and training records and Record Books furnished by the MTI; blank forms IE 2 to IE 6 in sufficient number; the BES oral question banks in WI 6 and WI 7; the day plan settled at the briefing; and identity tokens or numbered badges for candidates.

Venue readiness

16. By 0830 hours on the day of evaluation each Panel inspects its assessment area against the checklist in Form IE 5, confirms that video recording of every assessment area is switched on and operational, and satisfies itself on the safety of equipment, layout and materials. Deficiencies are brought to the Venue institution for rectification before commencement. Where a particular task cannot be conducted safely with the equipment available, the Chairperson substitutes an equivalent task from the task lists in Part D and records the substitution in the Committee Report.

Instructions to candidates

17. The MTI communicates the following to every eligible candidate in writing, as required by the Order, and produces proof of communication to MMD Chennai. The candidate reports at the Venue by 0800 hours on 16.09.2026 with a government photo identity document, the INDoS identity or any document bearing the candidate code used at the exit examination, and personal protective equipment consisting of boiler suit, safety helmet, safety shoes and hand gloves. Mobile telephones and electronic devices are deposited at registration and returned on departure. A candidate who does not carry acceptable identity is not assessed until identity is established to the satisfaction of the Observer.

Part D. Conduct of the Evaluation

Registration and attendance

18. Registration is conducted by the Observers from 0800 hours. The Observer verifies the identity of each candidate against Annexure I and the identity document produced, records attendance in Form IE 2 against the candidate's signature, and issues a numbered token which the candidate wears throughout. A person not named in Annexure I is not admitted. A candidate who does not report is marked absent in Form IE 2 and on the Assessment Sheet and is dealt with in the manner provided in the Order.

Day plan and batching

19. Candidates are assessed in groups of not more than ten. Each group is assessed by one Panel and then by the other, so that both Panels work in parallel throughout the day.

Within a Panel, the three members may run separate stations so that four to six candidates perform practical tasks at the same time, with the oral assessment taken by a member as candidates complete their tasks. The Chairperson settles the day plan at the briefing having regard to the number of eligible candidates and the stations available. Where it becomes apparent that all eligible candidates cannot be assessed on 16.09.2026, the Chairperson informs the Principal Officer, MMD Chennai, who may extend the evaluation to the following day by written communication under the Order. No candidate is assessed in haste to meet the day's end.

Common rules of conduct

20. The following rules, drawn from the BES guidelines, apply to every member throughout the evaluation.

- (a) The medium of communication is English as far as possible. Simple terms are used, the examiner speaks slowly and allows the candidate time to comprehend. A candidate who attempts to answer in English is encouraged. Where necessary for comprehension, a question may be explained in a language understood by both, and the answer is judged on substance.
- (b) The examiner is polite but firm, puts the candidate at ease, begins with one or two simple questions, avoids personal questions, and varies questions between candidates so that no trend can be anticipated.
- (c) The approach is to establish what the candidate knows rather than what the candidate does not know. Questions on basic safety bear importance and ignorance of basic safety attracts no compassion.
- (d) Members appreciate that a GP Rating trainee has no experience of operating machinery and will join a ship for further hands on practice. The standard is that of a trainee at support level commencing life on board.
- (e) Marks are awarded objectively on the task performed, having regard to the procedure followed, safe working practices, the end result and the time taken. Members of a Panel reach a consensus on each candidate. Marks are not awarded at the borderline out of compassion.
- (f) Members are not influenced by any account given by a candidate, the MTI or any other person about past practices, the circumstances of admission or the litigation. Professional judgement is applied without bias in either direction.
- (g) Marks and outcomes are not disclosed to any candidate, to the MTI, to the Venue institution or to any other person at any time. Members do not engage in argument or unrelated discussion with any person at the Venue.

- (h) No member accepts any favour, gift or hospitality.
- (i) A candidate who attempts an unsafe act is stopped at once, the act is recorded on the Assessment Sheet and marks are awarded accordingly.

Sequence for each candidate

21. Each eligible candidate undergoes four components: GSK practical, GSK oral together with verification of the GSK part of the Record Book, MEK practical, and MEK oral together with verification of the MEK part of the Record Book. The order in which a candidate attends the two Panels is immaterial. Every candidate performs every task group in the marking tables below; where a task group offers a choice, the Panel selects the task and records it.

GSK practical assessment (100 marks)

22. The GSK Panel assesses each candidate on the deck training area against the tasks and marks in the following table, adapted from BES Form RE 08A. The expectation stated against each task is the standard applied.

GSK oral assessment and Record Book (75 marks)

23. The GSK oral test is taken as part of the practical assessment and tests the candidate mainly on planning and the safe working practices to be observed in carrying out the practical tasks. It takes about fifteen to twenty minutes. The examiner asks not fewer than the minimum number of questions in each subject area using the question bank in

WI 6 as a guide, and may ask other questions of the same standard. Marks are awarded as in the following table, adapted from BES Form RE 07A.

Recording of marks and marginal cases

26. Marks are entered on the Assessment Sheet of the candidate contemporaneously by the Panel, component by component, and are not altered after entry except by a single line correction initialled by the Panel Lead. Where a candidate has scored marginally low in one area but well in others, the Panel may recall the candidate once for further questions or a further task before reaching a conclusion, and records the recall. Where a candidate's performance is unsatisfactory, the Panel records its specific observations on the Assessment Sheet.

Part E. Marking Scheme and Outcome

27. The maximum marks are 175 for GSK (practical 100, oral and Record Book 75) and 175 for MEK (practical 100, oral and Record Book 75). The pass norm applied is the BES norm of 60 per cent in each subject, namely 105 marks out of 175 in GSK and 105 marks out of 175 in MEK. Marks are not rounded up.
28. A candidate who obtains the pass norm in both GSK and MEK is recorded as having satisfied the Committee that the candidate has acquired the requisite practical knowledge and completed the necessary training, and the outcome on the Assessment Sheet is recorded as Satisfactory. A candidate who does not obtain the pass norm in either subject is recorded as Not Satisfactory. A candidate who does not appear is recorded as Absent, with no marks.
29. The outcome recorded by the Committee is a recommendation. Final candidate wise determination is made by DGMA on the record forwarded by MMD Chennai, as provided in the Order.

Part F. Records and Reporting

30. A separate Assessment Sheet in Form IE 3 is maintained for every eligible candidate, whether present or absent. It identifies the candidate, records attendance, the tasks assigned, the marks for each component, the Panel's observations, any recall, any unsafe act, any missing Record Book and the outcome. Each part is signed by all three members of the Panel concerned. The sheet is countersigned by the Chairperson and, as to identity and attendance, by the Observer.
31. The Chairperson consolidates the outcomes in the Summary in Form IE 4. Each Panel completes the facilities checklist in Form IE 5. The Chairperson completes the Committee Report in Form IE 6, which records the timings, the number of candidates assessed, task substitutions, recalls, late reporting, absentees, any interference, irregularity, complaint or incident, any offer of favour, and the Observers' notes.

32. At the conclusion of the evaluation on each day, all Assessment Sheets, the Summary, the checklists, the Committee Report, the Declarations and the attendance register are placed in a sealed cover and handed over to the Principal Officer, MMD Chennai or the nominated Surveyor against a receipt recorded in the Committee Report. The Record Books are returned to MMD Chennai under the covering list. No member retains any copy, photograph or note of any candidate's marks. The Venue institution preserves the video recording and furnishes a copy to MMD Chennai within two working days.
33. MMD Chennai consolidates the record and forwards it to DGMA for final determination in the manner provided in the Order. The record is preserved by MMD Chennai as part of the official file in W.A. No. 3347 of 2025.

Part G. Integrity, Safety and Amendment

34. Any attempt by the MTI, its representatives, the Venue institution, a candidate or any other person to interfere with, influence or improperly communicate with a member or Observer is recorded by the Chairperson in the Committee Report and reported to MMD Chennai. The Chairperson may exclude the person concerned from the Venue for the remainder of the evaluation.
35. A complaint or representation made by a candidate during the evaluation is recorded by the Observer and included in the Committee Report. No marks are reviewed or reconsidered at the Venue on the basis of a complaint.
36. The Venue institution keeps first aid and a person responsible for safety available throughout. Any injury or safety incident is attended to at once and recorded. Safety takes precedence over completion of any task.
37. This procedure may be modified only in writing by DGMA or by the Principal Officer, MMD Chennai. Operational decisions on the day concerning sequence, timing, task substitution, station arrangement and late reporting are taken by the Chairperson and recorded in the Committee Report.
